This building has a large set back from the street which is currently used for parking. This large brick and stone house has a tiled hipped roof which extends to cover the surrounding verandahs. The verandahs are supported on timber posts with a balustrade and baluster style frieze set between them. The centrally placed front entry door has a glass and timber surround. To each side of the front entry door, a brick bay has a central french door. Lateral to each bay, timber framed double hung windows are set into brick walls with pointed stone below the window ledges. The sides of the building are stone with brick quoining to the openings. Entry to the verandah is via four concrete steps. There is a brick extension to the rear.

Local knowledge suggests that this place has historic links with the Minninooka property in the Shire of Greenough. Local resident Barbara Shields claims that the house was owned by Mr Haddy, who owned Haddy's Dairy in that area. His daughter, Lorna married Lionel Duncan and they continued to own the house. Their daughter, Helen Jupp, sold the house to the present owners in late 1994 following which it was

redeveloped for use as a Medical Centre. At this stage a later addition was demolished and a new replacement section was built to the rear.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This large house has aesthetic appeal and demonstrates the use of brick and local stone in construction of housing of its era. The place makes a significant contribution to the built environment of the area given its large scale and built features such as the entry surround, french doors and verandah frieze.
