This large two storey building, of local stone construction, has had a new unsympathetic brick facade added to the street elevation. Multiple corrugated iron hipped roofs are evident. The north facade has a parapet wall with double hung timber framed windows. Adjoining the north elevation is a drive through bottle shop and to the rear there is an external timber staircase and balcony.

HISTORY

In 1872 George Baston built the one-storied Victoria Hotel on Lot 4. Several years later he built the two storey Victoria House on an adjacent lot where he resided for some years. Baston died in 1894 and in 1907 the hotel was threatened with demolition due to problems associated with the raising of Marine Terrace. Subsequently a portion of the hotel was rebuilt at a cost of £4000. Len Shepheard purchased the Victoria Hotel in 1922. (Bain, M.A., "A Life of its Own", City of Geraldton, 1996, pp119 & 132-133)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Victoria Hotel has considerable historic significance as one of the earlier hotels in the town. It has further significance for its connection to well known Geraldton businessman George Baston. Although the building has been altered, particularly the front facade, it nevertheless is a prominent part of the streetscape given its large scale and use of local materials.
