Located on the east side of Edward Road and to the north of the Georgina Homestead [Place No. 108], this stone house is built in a late Victorian early federation style and has a combination hipped and gable corrugated iron roof. The roof extends to cover the verandah to the front (west) and north elevations and is supported on timber posts with timber balustrading between. An iron awning covers the front window below the gable end and a lean-to carport has been added to the south facade. The house has been extensively restored and had major additions at the rear which presents an excellent example of sympathetic integrating and adaptation between old and new fabric.

2004/05 Review: To the north of the homestead are the ruins of a stone barn/stables.

The property was originally part of a large pastoral estate belonging to Mr Edward Hamersley. His son George called the part of the large estate he inherited 'Georgina'. The original Georgina Homestead was destroyed by fire in the early 1900s. The present homestead [Place No. 108] was built by the Hamersley family in the 1930s about two kilometres south of the original site. The stone house which is now a workman's residence once belonged to Mr Thompson, who was in charge of the Greenough Police Station.

The stone house has historic significance for its association with the Georgina pastoral property, the Hamersley family and Police Officer Thompson. The place has considerable aesthetic value and makes an important contribution to the built environment of the Back Flats.
