The cottage is of random limestone construction with a hipped corrugated iron roof which extends to cover the front (west) verandah. The verandah is supported on metal poles. The place has a symmetrical facade with two timber framed double hung 12-pane windows either side of a central french door. The lean-to at the rear has two simple stone chimneys. A small concrete block extension is located to the northeast corner of the cottage. There is a well situated approximately 20 metres to the north of the cottage.

James Carson, a Private in the 57th Regiment, was allocated this land and took up the title in 1874. In 1881, the property was sold to J. Osborne. In 1914 the cottage was owned by Mrs N. Osborne. The Rev. R. Laurie,

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

James Carson's Cottage and Well has considerable historic significance for its association with the Pensioner Guards who settled on the Greenough Flats in the 1860s and 1870s. The place has considerable aesthetic merit given its high integrity and good condition. The cottage is representative of simple stone residences of that era and makes an important contribution to the built fabric of the locale.
