The Logue Homestead is a large residence which has been extended over the years. The original four-roomed stone house to the front (west) has a hipped corrugated iron roof with a separate hipped verandah roof which is supported on twin metal poles and surrounds its three external sides. This section of the house features french doors opening onto the verandahs, pointed stonework, mini-orb ceilings, a tall corbelled brick chimney and stained glass windows to the main entrance which is via entry steps. To the rear a large timber framed and weatherboard clad addition was constructed in 1927. Behind the house is an old engine room. Situated some distance to the east is a large shearing shed which incorporates a structure of stone construction which is believed to be the original homestead on the property, although it is difficult to see evidence of this as there are no window openings.

2004/5 Review: The homestead has been reroofed, and verandah posts and doors have been replaced. The stone shed has 2 doors with brick edging centrally located in the west and east walls. The building has an earth floor.

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P. Morrissey took up the title to VL 439 in 1871 and built the original homestead. Frank Mills bought the property in 1901 and in 1906 the property was sold to the Logue family. The weatherboard extension to the homestead was added on in 1927.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Logue Homestead has considerable historic significance for its association with both the Morrissey and Logue families, who were well known in the district. Further the place is evidence of the settlement of the Greenough district. The place has aesthetic appeal given its use of local materials, its high integrity and built features such as french doors, pointed stonework and corbelled chimney. It forms an important part of the built fabric of Greenough.
