Located at the end of Honeysuckle Boulevard in the suburb of Woorree, this large old olive tree is on the south bank of the Chapman River. It is believed that Dr Foley's cottage was located nearby. The tree needs ongoing care from a tree surgeon as it has suffered at the hands of wood turners who have cut off limbs for their work and bee infestation.

HISTORY

It is believed that the olive tree was planted by Dr T. Foley in 1852. Dr Foley was born in 1840 and was a surgeon to the 24th Regiment. He came to Geraldton in c1850 as the surgeon for the 99th Regiment, becoming Geraldton's first doctor. Following the first survey of the Geraldton area in 1850 by Augustus Gregory, Dr Foley took up Lot 13 consisting of 17 acres. Dr Foley also built a small cottage approximately 20 metres south-east of the tree, however this was demolished in the 1960s by Tom Muir, who was then the owner of the property and the adjoining 'Sunnybanks Farm'. The land is currently owned by the Rowan family.

Further it is a rare remaining example of an introduced plant species from the beginnings of settlement in the area. The tree is an important part of the history of the Greenough Shire.
