Located on the west side of Gregory Road, Hackett's Cottage is a simple rectangular limewashed random rubble limestone building with a hipped corrugated iron roof. There is a simple limewashed stone chimney to the apex of the gable. The front (east) elevation of the building has a separate verandah roof. The verandah is supported on timber posts and has horizontal timber boarding as infill to the upper section at each end. Windows are large pane timber framed and double hung with casement windows to the rear. A small addition is located to the north-west corner of the main building.

HISTORY

This house was constructed in c1890 as the home of Ned and Harriet Hackett who ran a store on land to the north and adjacent to the cottage. There are no visible remains of the store but a well and a well bore are located nearby. Hackett's widow sold the property in 1914. Extensions were made to the building several times the most recent being in the 1960s. The building was largely reconstructed by the owners, the National Trust of Australia (WA), in the 1970s with additional restoration work including re-roofing in 1996.
