Located on the east side of the Brand Highway, 300 metres south of Scott Road, McNeece's Cottage is the ruins of a three roomed simple stone cottage. There is evidence that the walls were rendered and the building had a corrugated iron roof.

2004/05 Review: The stone walls show signs of further collapse, with vegetation growing out of the ruins.

Surviving from the time of the allocation of 32 lots for Pensioner Guards in 1857, this cottage was the home of Tom McNeece for many years. Local sources claim that in the 1960s when Peter McNeece lived in the cottage, the Midland Bus (now Westrail) from Perth used to stop there, beep its horn and Peter's dog would run out to collect the newspaper.

The cottage has been vacant since the early 1970s and has fallen into a ruinous condition. See also Felix Devlin's Cottage [Place No. 1] and Kelly's Cottage. [Place No. 7]

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

McNeece's Cottage has considerable historic significance for its association with the Pensioner Guards who settled on the Greenough Flats in the 1860s and 1870s. Although in very poor condition, the place is representative of the simple style of construction that was prevalent in the area at this time. Furthermore, the cottage is evidence of the use of local materials.
