Located behind the former St John's Catholic Church on a slight rise and in the middle of a paddock is the small Bootenal Cemetery. The small cemetery contains the marked and unmarked graves of several pioneers of the district, including six members of the McGuiness family.

2004/05 Review: The cemetery contains marble headstones commemorating Owen McGuiness died 1907, Bridget McGuiness died 1911, Ellen McGuiness died 1925, Bernard McGuiness died 1929, Henry James McGuiness died 1929, Michael McGuiness died 1933 and Josie McCagh died 1934.

The cemetery has been fenced with a weldmesh fence covered in shadecloth, and with a small white wooden gate to the east. Five eucalypts have been planted within the enclosure. To the south-east of the gate is a large boulder with a brass plaque attached on the north side. The plaque commemorates the 140th anniversary of the arrival in WA of Owen, Bridget & Bernard McGuiness on 6th April 1859. The plaque also lists the names of 43 people who were buried in the vicinity.

The small catholic cemetery includes the graves of Owen McGuiness (aged 71, died 31 January 1907) and his wife Bridget McGuiness, nee McCudden (aged 74, died 23 March 1911). Owen and Bridget McGuiness were born and married in Ireland. Other people buried in the cemetery are Bernard McGuiness (aged 72, died 19 March 1929) and Grace McGuiness (aged 79, died 31 March 1939) in a double grave. The Bootenal Cemetery also contains the graves of Henry James McGuiness (aged 51, died 3 September 1929) and Ellen McGuiness, nee O'Brien (aged 56, died 20 November 1925).
