Located on the south side of Phillips Road and to the west of Maley's Mill (Place No. 17) are a line of old olive trees. The trees are now growing over into the road reserve and are in need of the attention of tree surgeons due to extensive suckering and the indiscriminate cutting of branches by wood turners.

These trees were planted by J.S. Maley, owner of Maley's Mill (Place No.17). It is believed the young trees/seedlings came from the Benedictine Monastery at New Norcia. They are reputed to be the largest olive trees growing in the Shire of Greenough.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Phillips Road olive trees have high significance for their association with John Stephen Maley, a prominent colonist on the Greenough Flats. Further they are a rare remaining example of an introduced plant species from the beginnings of settlement on the Greenough Flats. These trees are an important component of the history of the Shire of Greenough.
