The consultants were unable to access the site. The following description is drawn from Feilman, M., "Greenough Historical Survey of the Front Flats", 1977: Located on the west side of Company Road, approximately 700 metres north of the Brand Highway junction, are the ruins of a two-roomed stone cottage which had a corrugated iron roof, a rear lean-to, front verandah, outbuildings, well, tank and stone walls.

2004/05 Review: No evidence was found of the stone cottage.

The first title holder of VL 727 was A. & G. Shenton who took up title on 7/12/1871. The block was sold by G. Shenton to J. Perejuan for £50 on 11/12/1878. John Perejuan was a Spanish migrant who arrived with the Benedictine monks in 1849. He married Mary Farmer in Perth in 1855 and moved to Greenough as a farmer in 1862. Perejuan was also the proprietor of "The Hunting Kangaroo Arms" at Allenooka. He died in 1900 and is buried in the Greenough Cemetery (Site No 26). By 1904 the land was owned by Smith and occupied by Henry Pass. Charles Duncan later purchased the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The ruin of Smith Cottage has only some historic significance as evidence of the settlement patterns on the Greenough Flats in the 1860s.
