7 St. John of God Sub Centre (Mayor Clune)

The St John Ambulance Service Sub Centre in Geraldton will be celebrating 100-year anniversary in four years.

As the Greenough Museum has such historical significance in the area, the City of Greater Geraldton is proud to be a part of the team trusted to deliver this project.

Due to the existing paintwork and render at the Greenough Museum being in differing states of disrepair, it was it very difficult to commit to a methodology of paint removal, as common industry practices would be far too robust on such a delicate canvas. Fortunately, we had engaged contractors who have vast experience in heritage restoration and their knowledge was vital to the success of the project.



We found that existing paint work was very stubborn to remove in certain areas. A few trial patches were carried out using different types of non-invasive paint removers.

Further to consultation and trial patches being carried out on site, it was decided that Dulux PRECISION Restoration Coating Remover (Red) was the most effective product for this project. The coating was trowelled on to ensure sufficient coverage and allowed the moisture in the product to be maintained. This coating was then covered by sheets of Dulux PRECISION Paper Roll to ensure the remover remained wet and active, as well as protecting it from the inclement local weather, including the Greenough winds.



We found that rolling on the product was insufficient due to the highly weather exposed facade — with both heat and wind having a negative impact on the efficiency of the product. Trowelling the product on helped to resolve this issue. This decision obviously had a cost impact as we required more product, however it was necessary to achieve the desired result and limit damage to the building.

The low-level sections on the west elevation were coated in the first instance and the cement rendered low level section on the one-storey west elevation were done next whilst the weather conditions were favourable.



As work progressed we discovered that the stonework to the areas which were cement rendered on the single-storey section had become very loose and appeared to be hollow. The stonemasons recommended that these areas needed to be repaired and finished with a lime render from ground level to a height of approximately 800mm.

Restricted access to the north elevation meant this was then completed using a double storey alloy tower. This allowed City in Colour to keep moving on the prioritised double storey section.



The EWP had some mechanical issues and had to be returned to the hire company. During this time the front single-storey section on the north elevation and the return on the east elevation had the paint removed using the same method outlined above.





While we were aware of the two storey main building being the priority we nevertheless had to utilize the available labour in areas we could access whilst the EWP was being repaired; requiring the team to work flexibly and manage the time productively.



The plasterers arrived on site as programmed in the delivery plan on Week 4. Keboda Stone have many years' experience and their confidence in completing the job on time and to the required standard was apparent from the offset.

Following the initial sample areas being carried out on the walls it was agreed by both CGG and Gary Martin, the Curator of the Greenough Museum, that it would be better aesthetically if we could try and maintain the joint work which is scratched in whilst the render is curing. We believe this to be in keeping with the traditional look of the building and consistent with sound heritage practice to match what was originally in place.

Inclement weather became an issue during the project and as such undercover areas were favoured to ensure project progress was maintained. The old render was found to be consistently loose at low levels. This was particularly evident on the north elevation, when the contractors started exposing the brickwork. The old brickwork was fascinating as it illustrated the use of different materials as well as the craftsmanship involved during the original construction of the building. However to provide the building with longevity and to retain the proper aesthetic, it was decided this was to be covered with render to remain consistent with the rest of the building.



The original brickwork is unique in its laying and offers a glimpse of the pride and craftsmanship of the original builders of the place. For the longevity of the building and to adhere with heritage requirements, it was imperative that we cover this brickwork with the lime render, but it has been photographed and documented nevertheless.



Large areas of render had to be removed due to deterioration, with layer of new lime render applied in its place. This finish will allow the building to breath along with protecting the stone and brickwork from the elements.

In larger areas such as this and in areas of considerable cracking, a membrane has been applied to stop the cracking coming through on the newly applied layer.

Curing time was vital to allow thorough drying of the product and allow the salts to come out of the product before we applied the primer product. The different curing times were dependent on the thickness of the render. This process was managed onsite by moisture and salt/ph. testing to ensure the subject areas were fully cured prior to the application of the primer product.

CGG also received a request from the Greenough Museum Curator Gary Martin, for a glass panel to be installed on the north elevation, to capture the existing paintwork and its layers from over the years. In consultation with the CGG Heritage Adviser, we agreed on an appropriate area which offered a unique picture through time. We engaged a local glass company to supply a 1100mm x 900mm glass panel with 45mm standoff brackets, which was installed by CGG.



The differing layers are evidence of the history of the building. The line marking again is a point of interest and shows the craftsmanship involved in the early decoration of the building.



The glass panel has captured a moment in time, and really has become a focal point of the building which Museum visitors seem to take a great interest in. The inspiration for this idea was taken from the conservation works undertaken at the Original Geraldton Railway Station, located at 246 Marine Terrace, where the original hand painted Library sign was encapsulated using the same offset glass process.

As the restoration continued, and we consistently faced the issue of loose render at low level. This consistency indicated a bigger issue, that just the replacing of loose render, wouldn't resolve in the long term. The building was consistently rejecting the old render and was literally being held together by a the layer of paint in some areas.

After carrying out some investigation works it became obvious the problem was rising damp; a combination of moisture ingress into the brickwork and salt rising through the rising damp. The stone masons from Keboda Stone recommended using a product called Dry Zone, which is injected every 100mm into the blocks work of the building to create a barrier between the blockwork and the damp. We sought advice from local Geraldton-based Heritage Architect Bruce Sherwood from Eastman Poletti and Sherwood Architects who endorsed this product and wrote it into the specifications of heritage building restoration works.



This process was carried out around the entire building to ensure we protected the stone walls against rising damp for years to come.

As the refurbishment works continued to take shape, and the Old Church White lime wash breathed new energy into the building, it indirectly highlighted other areas which could benefit from some tender loving care.

Sound management of the project meant the budget was underspent, and as such the judgement was made to extend the scope of works for the painting contractors to include all the exterior timber elements, including window frames, verandah posts and banisters etc. The completed work has really given the whole building a fresh new look and we managed to colour match the paint to great effect to maintain the integrity of the building.



The colour of the woodwork is really in keeping with the building and was perfectly colour matched to capture the building in its original glory.

Following the completion of the scope of works for the main building there was still funds available in the budget. Consequently a review of the Greenough Museum Precinct was undertaken by key CGG staff, the CGG Heritage Adviser in consultation with the Museum Curator Gary Martin to identify key areas which would benefit from restoration works and really improve the longevity of the museum.

Together, and with reference to the Conservation Management Plan List of recommended works, it was agreed that the outbuildings and the perimeter garden walls to the east and front of the building were the main areas of disrepair which would benefit from some attention.

Keboda Stone worked tirelessly at removing the old plaster and re rendering the outbuildings and repairing the stone garden walls which, in some areas, were literally crumbling away.

Due to the amount of rising damp affecting the outbuilding, particularly the southern elevation, the decision was made to use the dry zone injection method to help slow down the deterioration of the blockwork.









Overall, the Greenough Museum Conservation Project is a project everyone involved can be proud of. There was a risk trying to deliver a project like this on a schedule of rates, but it allowed us to keep close track of the expenditure and ultimately allowed us to increase our scope of works and include other much needed restoration works. Not only are the stakeholders pleased with the look of the building but can be rest assured that everything possible has been done to ensure the longevity of the building.

The restoration works have provided untold benefits which will add years onto the lifespan of the building. The heritage building really is imposing with its new clean look against the blue skies of Greenough.
